4. New Co-ordinating Editor of Cochrane Colorectal Cancer

We are delighted to announce the appointment of Jacob Rosenberg as the new Co-ordinating Editor of [Cochrane Colorectal Cancer](#) at the Herlev Hospital and University of Copenhagen in Denmark.

Professor Rosenberg has authored or co-authored nearly 800 publications, including 706 scientific articles, 53 book chapters, and 26 textbooks, and has delivered several hundred scientific lectures internationally and within Denmark. He is a Fellow of the American College of Surgeons, US. He has been Editor in Chief for *Ugeskrift for Læger* and the Danish Medical Journal for 13 years and associate editor of the Scandinavian Journal of Surgery for 2 years. He was also a member of the International Committee of Medical Journal Editors (ICMJE) for 7 years and is past president of The Royal Copenhagen Medical Society.

Professor Rosenberg said: *"I am delighted to take this position and look very much forward to the work. Cochrane Colorectal Cancer has currently a broad scope covering various issues within abdominal surgery. My goal is to streamline the editorial process, to continue the great work of enhancing the quality of the reviews, and to increase awareness and importance of the publications from our Cochrane Review Group."*

Undertaking a qualitative evidence synthesis to support decision-making in a Cochrane context: 14th June 2018

In Cochrane, qualitative evidence syntheses must be linked with a named intervention effect review and are undertaken to explore specific phenomena of interest, such as: complexity, heterogeneity; variation in outcomes; implementation, feasibility, acceptability etc. New Cochrane Qualitative and Implementation Methods Guidance published in the Journal of Clinical Epidemiology in December 2017 outlines three qualitative evidence synthesis methods to select from. These methods will be presented and their applicability discussed.

This webinar is intended for review authors who want to or have conducted a qualitative evidence synthesis to subsequently integrate with a Cochrane effect review. It will consist of brief presentations followed by Q&A sessions. 9. Cochrane Priority Reviews List - March 2018 revision

The March 2018 revision of the Cochrane Priority Reviews List includes new titles from the Cochrane Effective Practice & Organisation of Care, Oral Health; and Pregnancy & Childbirth Groups.

The following three titles on the list are open to new authors - please note restrictions:

1. Antioxidants for respiratory function in Duchenne muscular dystrophy – Neuromuscular Disease (*Open only to authors with Duchenne muscular dystrophy research and clinical practice expertise*)
2. Particle versus photons for the treatment of chordoma – Neuro-oncology/ Gynaecological Cancer
3. Prediction models for adjuvant chemotherapy or radiotherapy for women with endometrial cancer - Gynaecological Cancer

Cochrane-wide prioritisation remains an important project, with almost 230 priority reviews or updates published since the project began in January 2015.

Please be aware that all titles in the priority list have author teams in place, except for those mentioned above. If you are interested in one of these open titles please contact the relevant Cochrane Review Group before submitting a review proposal.

11. Apply for the Cochrane-REWARD prize for reducing waste in research

Cochrane is now calling for nominations for the 2018 prize.

Deadline for nominations is 15th May 2018

An estimated \$170 billion of research funding is wasted each year because its outcomes cannot be used. The waste occurs during 5 stages of research production: question selection, study design, research conduct, publication, and reporting. Much of this waste appears to be avoidable or remediable, but there are few proposed solutions.

To stimulate and promote research in this area, Cochrane announces the Cochrane-REWARD prize.

All nominations will be assessed using the following criteria:

1. The nominee has addressed at least one of the 5 stages of research waste (questions, design, conduct, publication, reporting) in the area of health;
2. The nominee has pilot or more definitive data showing the initiative can lower waste;
3. The initiative can be scaled up;
4. The estimated potential reduction in research waste that the initiative might achieve.

Nominations for the 2018 prize, should be submitted by 15 May 2018. Two prizes will be awarded (a 1st prize of £1500 and a 2nd prize of £1000), but other shortlisted candidates will also be highlighted to help disseminate good ideas.

The winners of the 2018 prize will be announced at the Cochrane Colloquium, Edinburgh, 16-18 September, 2018.

12. 2017 Dashboard now available

[Cochrane's Annual Dashboard](#) presents some key metrics on our organizational performance over the previous calendar year. It includes data on Strategy to 2020 target achievements, and key metrics around the four Strategy to 2020 **Goals**. **It's an excellent tool to use to reflect on what we accomplished in 2017 and the work to be done in 2018.**

Some highlights from the 2017 dashboard include:

- Record numbers of people accessed and used Cochrane evidence to inform their health decisions: 12.5 million Reviews accessed from the Cochrane Library in 2017 (28% up from 2016); and Cochrane.org web visits increased from 5.7 million in 2015 to over 15 million in 2017.
- New national licences in India and South Africa contributed to 3.66 billion people worldwide having free at the point of use access to the Library.
- **All of Cochrane's 2017 targets were met with the exception of the launch of the new Cochrane Library (which is now scheduled for April 2018).**
- Cochrane Library sales and royalties increased dramatically compared with 2016, contributing to a 17% increase in overall income and a £269,000 operational surplus. Cochrane reserves rose to £5.65 million.

TaskExchange now has almost 2,100 contributors collaborating on systematic review and guidelines projects, with tasks including language translation, consumer and clinical review, data extraction, screening and guideline development.

Newcomers:

We are always evolving and improving, and our most recent features aim to make TaskExchange even better for translators as well as newcomers to the world of evidence.

Evidence newcomers can now browse beginner tasks directly from the TaskExchange homepage. And all beginner tasks are marked with a green leaf, so they can be easily identified in the general task list. **If you're posting a task, consider labelling it as an entry level.**

Translators:

Translation tasks are very popular on TaskExchange, and the platform has a dedicated group of translators with skills in many languages. To streamline the platform for translation tasks, several changes have been made. These include the ability to browse translations tasks from

the home page, to filter for tasks in a particular language, to receive weekly email alerts related to that language only, and to nominate language skills in personal profiles.
